

In 2024, 8 UCBC staff members completed their graduate or doctoral programs, bringing the total to 22 advanced degrees through ASP. An additional 18 staff members are currently enrolled in programs around the globe and we are on track to reach our 25 x 25 goal - 25 graduates by 2025.





Vocational Training

At the Holistic Family Development Center (HFD), incredible strides are being made to empower women through education and skill-building. By offering vocational and literacy training, women are equipped with the tools they need to create better futures for themselves and their families. In 2024, 52 women were equipped through HFD's vocational and literacy training. These programs not only help women gain valuable skills but also open doors to economic independence, leadership, and opportunity.

NYOTA

In collaboration with Impact Now, UCBC launched the NYOTA Leadership program for women in the fall. NYOTA, meaning "star" in Swahili, is designed to inspire and equip women with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to lead in their communities and beyond. This new initiative empowers women to become change-makers, leaders, and advocates for positive change, offering mentorship, training, and support tailored to their needs. NYOTA graduated its first cohort of 24 women in December.

Development Team

In 2024, UCBC formed its first formal Development Office team with the purpose of strengthening partnership development, diversifying funding sources, and improving communications and marketing. It is a significant step towards strengthening sustainability and positioning UCBC for growth in one of the most challenging contexts. Through its efforts, the DO team was able to secure \$1.8 million in project funding for UCBC.

Solar Project - Completed in 2024

The solar project at UCBC was completed in 2024. The campus now has at least 8 hours of sustainable power daily. The project included the installation of solar panels and a bank of batteries with a 94 kWh storage capacity. It is anticipated that during the sunny summer months, the batteries will be able to provide 24 hours of energy.



WASH Project - Phase One Completed in 2024

- Facilities in the UCBC Administration Building were upgraded and expanded.
- Facilities in the UCBC Community Center were operationalized by constructing a septic system.
- The UCBC student toilet block was upgraded and expanded.
- Each location now has hand-washing facilities, hand dryers, and trash cans.



A large water tank capacity of 10,000 liters was also installed on the UCBC campus. This strategic infrastructure project ensures a continuous supply of drinking water for UCBC and the local community. A mini water treatment plant now at UCBC provides clean water at an affordable price to the entire community of Beni. This eco-friendly system uses solar power and reusable jerry cans.





Phase one also included instruction for the women of the Holistic Family Development (HDF) vocational training program on how to sew reusable menstrual hygiene pads from a local trainer. Lack of information or misinformation and lack of supplies are primary barriers to girls' and young women's educational attainment. The women of HFD created 350 pad kits which were distributed, along with educational materials, to women and girls over age 12 at UCBC and the two primary schools.




2024 Financial Summary
